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Safeguarding and the Theology of Safeguarding

A Biblical Mandate for Safeguarding

Proverbs 31:8-9 reminds us: *“Speak out on behalf of the voiceless, and for the rights of vulnerable people. Speak out in order to judge with righteousness and to defend the needy and the poor.”* This call to action is woven throughout Scripture, as God repeatedly commands His people to care for the most vulnerable—orphans, widows, strangers, and children.

The Bible mentions justice and care for the vulnerable over 2,000 times, showing how central this is to our faith. The Church should be a sanctuary where everyone feels welcome and secure. However, safeguarding requires intentionality. Harm can occur anywhere, including places of worship, which is why we must foster an environment where abuse has no place and where people are encouraged to speak up.

A safe church culture is not accidental; it takes collective effort. It means:

- Ensuring clear safeguarding policies and procedures.
- Cultivating an atmosphere of openness, humility, and accountability.
- Empowering individuals to speak out when something is wrong.

Theology of Safeguarding

Thirtyone:eight, a Christian safeguarding organisation, outlines three key themes that underpin the theology of safeguarding:

- **Mandate:** Every generation is called to care for the vulnerable. This is a non-negotiable part of our faith.
- **Motivation:** Our love for God and for people compels us to pursue justice and protection for the weak.
- **Mission:** We are called to actively work towards environments where people are safe, heard, and valued.

Wisdom in Safeguarding

Proverbs 31 urges us to act wisely in protecting the vulnerable. True wisdom is not just about recognising risks but actively creating environments where people flourish. A wise church is one that takes safeguarding seriously, ensuring that it reflects God's love through its actions.

Safeguarding and the Gospel

At its core, safeguarding is about the Gospel. Jesus came to bring good news to the poor, freedom to the oppressed, and healing to the brokenhearted. He welcomed children, stood up for the marginalised, and called His followers to do the same. When we safeguard, we embody His love and create spaces where people can experience His grace.
